MESSAGE FROM THE

GENERAL MANAGER

Dear Member,

In 2021, your Cooperative experienced tremendous growth. We added over 6,000 new accounts throughout our five-county service territory bringing our year end total to 243,645 electric services in place. As the pandemic raged throughout the country, it created major supply chain challenges that are expected to continue through 2022. WREC made historic investments in our local education systems and continued efforts to improve access to mental health services.

Everywhere you look throughout the Tampa Bay area, you see growth. Our dedicated team is working with our partner, Seminole Electric Cooperative to ensure we have enough generation and transmission capacity to deliver safe, reliable, and sustainable power for the future. Seminole has embarked on a major expansion in renewable energy with over 300 megawatts of new utility scale solar. They also have a new natural gas generation facility under construction in Putnam County. Seminole will close one of its coal generation units when the gas unit is in full operation. This expansion will reduce Seminole's carbon dioxide emissions 36%; the equivalent of removing approximately 650,000 cars from the road by 2024.

Our communities are growing and so are their needs. In 2021, WREC's Educational Foundation made significant investments in technical education in Pasco, Hernando, and Citrus counties. We donated/pledged over \$600,000 to purchase equipment, which will be used to train our next generation and provide them with the skills they need to succeed in today's highly competitive work environment.

WREC's Educational Foundation also donated \$480,000 to light Withlacoochee River Electric Co-op Park, at Pasco-Hernando State College's west campus. This park will host baseball tournaments for teams all over the county/state and will double as an outdoor event center.

Expanding access to mental health services has been one of our core missions over the past seven years. Your Cooperative was instrumental in opening Vincent House Pasco and Vincent House Hernando. Vincent House Pasco has a new 9,500 square foot building and we are currently working on a new facility in Hernando County. This 6,500 square foot center is being named after our Member and Florida Senate President, Wilton Simpson. Senator Simpson has worked hand in hand with WREC to improve mental heath services in our communities.

WREC anticipates extensive growth over the next several years. As we expand, we will continue to grow investments in our communities and work with Seminole Electric Cooperative on a sustainable path for the future.

WORKING TOWARDS A CARBON FREE FUTURE!

Reducing emissions is a top priority. New technology and cleaner sources of energy are now being used. Since 2005, Seminole Electric Cooperative has had an 80% reduction in air emissions and an EPA Low Emitting Status given for mercury emissions. With the removal of one coal unit, a greater than 90% reduction in both sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxide and a 45% reduction in carbon dioxide emissions is on track. The chart from Seminole Electric below shows the future projections.

These projections also include renewable energy. WREC currently has two solar arrays at different offices and has plans for a solar farm in the future. Solar farms have



already been built in our service area or are in the process of being built. They will continue to be a reliable source of clean and alternative energy in the future.

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THRIVING ECONOMIC GROWTH

WREC is poised for explosive economic growth over the next few years. In 2021, we added 6,109 new services in our five county service area for a total of 243,645 services in place.

Construction has increased dramatically including new roads, homes, apartments, businesses, and schools. One such school under construction is the Kirkland Ranch Academy of Innovation located in the Wesley Chapel area. WREC's Educational Foundation pledged \$400,000 to purchase equipment for the school upon its completion (Fall 2022). Approximately 1,000 students will be attending this 184,000 square foot Academy of Innovation. Programs offered will include digital technology, engineering, biomedical science, transportation, building technology, and many others. The 104-acre school site is about three miles due east of Interstate 75; an area where growth is expected to increase dramatically in the coming years.





2021 YEAR IN REVIEW

January –

Donated over \$72,000 to the United Way between the Co-op and its employees; a shining example of the Seventh Cooperative Principle - Concern for the Community

February –

Lowered electric rates for the fourth year in a row

March –

Our System Reliability Department continued to invest in drone usage to locate and correct outages before they occur

April –

74th Annual Meeting canceled due to COVID-19

May –

Received the Audrey Nelson Community Achievement Award from HUD for our collaboration on the Vincent House Pasco project

June –

WREC's Educational Foundation donated \$121,000 to Central High School in Hernando County for new equipment and technology for students

July –

WREC's Educational Foundation pledged \$400,000 to Kirkland Ranch Academy of Innovation to purchase technical equipment for the 1,000 students who will attend upon completion

August -

Surpassed 60,000 subscribers for Power Outage notifications, a free innovative option offered to our Members to keep them informed

September -

Sent twenty-one employees with material and equipment to Louisiana to help power restoration efforts after Hurricane Ida

October –

Assisted 13 families in 2021, disbursing over \$87,000 from our Operation Round-Up program. Over \$2.3 million has been distributed helping 652 families.

November –

Awarded 110 scholarships to high school seniors for \$12,000 each totaling \$1.32 million. Since 1997, 2,194 college scholarships have been awarded with a potential payout of over \$15.8 million.

December -

WREC's Board of Trustees approved a \$21 million Capital Credits refund. Over \$427 million has been refunded to date.

ORU replaced their A/C system to help provide some relief for this family.

Meet **Marty Martin**, a Member in Port Richey. Marty was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer. In battling this disease, he went through chemo and radiation and still must go through intravenous therapy. Marty is on disability now and with limited income, there is not much left over. Marty's roof was in desperate need of repair. ORU replaced the roof so that Marty can continue his treatment and recovery at home.

Electronic Fund Transfers (EFT) has over 52,000 Members enrolled, an increase of more than 4,000 from last year. This program automatically deducts your monthly electric bill from your checking or savings account.

E-Billing

Our paperless billing program, *Electronic Billing*, reached 50,199 members in 2021, an increase of more than 5,000 Members. *E-billing* reduces paper use by not printing your monthly electric bill.

System Reliability is critical to Member satisfaction. Average outage times are measured by the System Average Interruption Duration Index (SAIDI) number. As shown by the chart, WREC's number dropped for the fourth year in a row, showing a slight decrease from 2020. WREC continues to focus on maintenance and system hardening to keep our electric grid functioning in a safe and reliable manner.

In 2021, WREC...

- Ended the year with 521 employees
- Added 6,109 new services
- Closed the year with 11,505 miles of energized power lines
- Completed 40,625 reconnects
- Completed 40,525 disconnects
- Answered 297,673 Member calls
- Trimmed tree limbs away from 1,670 miles of power lines and completed 4,824 right-of-way related service orders to help prevent unnecessary power outages
- Invested over \$30.9 million in new materials and supplies
- Maintained a fleet of 301 vehicles
